## A 24-Hour Trauma and Crisis Support Hub

At Harsha Foundation, our long-term vision is to establish a 24-hour trauma and crisis care centre — a safe, welcoming place where individuals in distress can walk in and receive immediate, face-to-face support at any time of the day or night. Because we know that pain doesn't wait for business hours. Crisis doesn't schedule itself. And when someone is at their breaking point, the support they need must be available right then and there — not in days or weeks.

Too many people fall through the cracks simply because the help they need is delayed, unavailable, or spread across multiple disconnected services. They may be dealing with homelessness, domestic violence, addiction, mental health struggles, financial collapse, grief, or trauma. These are heavy loads to carry — and when someone finally reaches out, they deserve more than a waiting list or a generic brochure.

That's why we're working toward creating a round-the-clock, all-under-one-roof support centre — a hub where individuals are met with compassion, dignity, and action.

## We envision a facility that provides:

Immediate crisis intervention with trained, empathetic staff available 24/7
Warm meals, hygiene access, and clean clothing for those in urgent need
On-site counselling and trauma-informed support without long wait times
Emergency shelter and safe spaces for DV victims, vulnerable women, men, and
families

Life skill and empowerment workshops, budgeting support, and mentorship Referrals to mental health professionals, housing, rehab, and employment services A place where people can wash their clothes, take a breath, feel human again

Our vision is about accessibility, dignity, and humanity. It's about making help simple to find and safe to receive, no matter the time or situation. It's about meeting people where they are, not judging where they've been.

We're not just building a centre. We're building a community-powered sanctuary, a beacon of hope for people walking through their darkest hours.

Because every person deserves the chance to be seen, heard, supported — and to heal.
